Dear Friends,

I recall an intriguing title for a book: *The God of Surprises.* It is a lovely positive title, and reflects an important truth which the Christian faith proclaims: God has good things in store for us! His love is surprising, and rightly understood, should



bring colour to an otherwise monochrome existence.

If surprises speak of the good things in life, it is also worth remembering that nothing takes God by surprise. However, wars, tragedies, tensions or difficulties at home or abroad often do not come as expected and can take us completely by surprise.

Worth holding onto is the fact that when these times do occur, and they will, rest assured that nothing takes our loving and caring God by surprise. How should we allow this truth to embed and be lived out in our lives?

Can I commend the wonderful Psalm 46 to you?

God is our refuge and strength an ever-present help in time of trouble.

It speaks of wars, and rumours of wars, and much dislocation and trouble around. The Psalm then advocates stopping and being still, and allowing the space to bring its own message that he is there. It is the complete opposite of our natural reaction to panic and worry.

God does not come naturally to most people; I have found we all need help discovering him. So let him surprise you, knowing that nothing takes him by surprise, and that in being still we may know in fact that He is God. (Psalm 46).

My Faith & My Role in the Community



Energetic saver of the world's resources, passionate worker for justice and fairness, director and gardener,

HELEN LONGLEY

is a caring and creative lady. You might know her from FEAST lunches, Teddies toddler group, preaching, taking funerals, as a chaplain at Rochester cathedral, or as the director that brought you Joseph, Passion Plays and "Do You Hear the People Sing!"

Q: How would you introduce yourself? A Blitz baby, born in London in November 1940, when the bombing raids were at their fiercest, Mum not knowing whether she would ever see my Dad again, a naval officer facing daily danger on the high seas. I have been married to Dick for 58 years with four wonderful children and 15 beloved grandchildren. Blessed with so much family love and joy and the delight of dear friends, I've never had to experience what my parents went through. What drives me to passionate action on behalf of the vulnerable - especially children - and our beautiful but damaged earth, is my faith as a disciple of Jesus and to honour the sacrifices of those who gave us peace in the UK.

Q: You have a very active faith. What inspired you in the first place?

At the age of 13 I was a bell ringer, standing on a box to reach the bell rope! Our vicar insisted every bell ringer attended evening service. That act of worship was beautiful and reflective. I felt drawn to become confirmed. I still pray the confirmation prayer: 'defend this thy child with thy heavenly grace, that she may continue thine forever'.

Q: Would you like to share some of the passionate action which your faith has inspired you to pursue?

I was inspired to become a teacher when we lived in the States, where our four children were born and Dick was a teaching assistant at Rutgers university. I was involved in a programme led by Martin Luther King to help children in ghettos. That's when I realised how important teaching was and how imperative it was to 'speak for those who cannot speak for themselves'. That's what I believe Jesus calls us to – to witness his compassionate love in words and action. Many years later I had the privilege of directing the Tonbridge Passion Plays, taking the greatest story in the world beyond church walls and sharing a journey with people of all ages and talents.

Q: You spoke earlier about the vulnerable – especially children – and our beautiful damaged earth.

Every day we see devastating scenes of innocent children suffering and our beautiful earth being repeatedly destroyed. I often feel overwhelmed and helpless. But as a passionate Christian I believe God calls us to love him and love our global neighbours in nurturing the gifts of beauty he has given us and caring for the most vulnerable. So whether it's FEAST for kids here in Tonbridge, TWR, an active member of the Rochester Anti-Modern Slavery Group (*see below*), going on a rally urging MPs to reunite child refugees with their families in the UK, welcoming bees by sowing wild flower seeds, growing herbs for healing... all kinds of things! I just try to do what I can where I live and thank God for all he has given me.

75 years of making music in Tonbridge

Tonbridge Philharmonic Society

is a large group of 165+ local musicians, who come together each week to enjoy singing or playing their instruments together. The orchestra meets on Monday evenings, and the choir meets on

Wednesday evenings. Each season, Tonbridge Philharmonic Society holds six musical events in local Tonbridge churches. There are three choral concerts, where the orchestra accompanies the choir, two orchestral concerts where our instrumentalists are given a chance to 'spread their wings' and explore the wonderful repertoire of symphonies and concertos, and one very popular Family Carols event which takes place each Christmas at the beautiful Chapel of St. Augustine, Tonbridge School.

Currently half way through the 74th season, the next combined choral and orchestral concert on Saturday 28th March will include delicious music by Camille Saint-Saëns and Gabriel Fauré, with Maurice Duruflé's Requiem forming the highlight of the programme. The concert will take place at the Chapel of St. Augustine, Tonbridge School. The combined forces will be conducted by new Music Director, **Benjamin Westerman** (right) who joined the society in January 2020.

On **Saturday 16th May**, Tonbridge Philharmonic will be back at St. Peter & St. Paul's Parish Church where the orchestra will be celebrating the 250th anniversary of Ludwig van Beethoven's birth with a performance of his Symphony No. 7. We are also

St Philip's Golden jubilee

On 26th April 1970 there was a buzz of excitement in the air at the newly completed "Cage Green Church Hall" (now known as St Philip's Church) as the

community gathered to welcome the Right Rev'd David Say, Bishop of Rochester, for the dedication ceremony. Right from the start the new Hall was to provide activities for all ages as well as regular services.

The Vicar at the time, the Rev'd Canon Bewes, remarked that this day was the

culmination of "years of patient waiting, praying and working".

As the Bishop pointed out during the service "this special place was only made possible by the gifts and labour of many, many people". Here we will take a short look at some of those people. Sadly, there is not enough room to mention every contribution. More information can be found by consulting the Parish Church Records.

The story begins with a hopeful vision and a generous gift. In the mid-1950s housing was rapidly being developed around Cage Green. For some time, Tonbridge Parish Church had been giving prayerful consideration to making spiritual provision for this new community. Miss Burt, for 38 years Headmistress of Newlands School in St Mary's Road, generously offered a



simple wooden building which had formerly housed the school for use by the parish.

However, the proffered building was situated on the other side of Tonbridge. Not daunted, an Ecumenical Work Camp was organised in August 1956. Twentyfive young Christians were invited, representing 13 countries, to stay and work together. These were led by Wolf Muller, a young German Curate from the Parish Church and included Father Philip Koutoufas, a Greek Orthodox Deacon, and Tesfaye Alemore, an Ethiopian. Local parishioners worked to prepare the Hall and to provide hospitality to the young guests. In spite of inclement English weather and language barriers, the old school hut was soon successfully

moved to the Cage Green site under the supervision of Mr Webb the architect. It would serve the community for around thirteen years.

Mention must be made of Mr George Glew, whose strong faith was a driving force in the establishment of the new church, and eventually led him to

ordination. The congregation continued to grow and in 1963 ambitious plans were made to build a new large church and hall. However, these had to be

shelved as funds were not available within the Diocese at the time.

In 1969 another application was made to erect a multipurpose Hall which would have a total cost of £20,000. Of this the



Diocese would provide half and the rest would be raised locally. The community worked hard and dug deep to raise the money and the new Hall opened free of debt.

In conclusion I think we can do no better than to add our own "Amen" to the prayer first made at the dedication service in 1970 and repeated at the silver jubilee in 1995:

"O God our Heavenly Father, make the door of this church wide enough to receive all who need human love and fellowship, and a Father's care, and narrow enough to shut out all envy, pride and uncharitableness.

Here may the tempted find strength, and the sorrowing receive comfort; here may the lonely find fellowship, and the careless be brought to repentance; and here may all Thy children renew their strength in Thee, and go on their way rejoicing; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

A Thought On...

Space for you and God

The great statesmanlike pianist Artur Schnabel is famous for saying "Playing the piano is easy, it is just the silences that are hard!" Whether you tickle the ivories or play the piano regularly, my point is not to aid music practice, but to give a prompt about life itself.

The notes, the tune, the noise, the melody, and the composition we make on our life's journey, needs time, space, and reflection. We need to find the meaning and purpose behind the activities, between life's busy round of work, rest and play. This is where Lent comes in:

A time to reflect, stop, and listen; to give meaning to the notes of life.

This is, of course, the hardest thing to do, which is why the discipline of Lent is not a moment in time, a good bit of the day, or a good week or a good holiday - but a good slab of time, six weeks, to press home meaning. In this time, discipline and change can take place.

This year, during Lent we will have five evenings of reflection: Tuesdays from 3rd March, 7.45 for 8pm at St Philip's church. There will be the sounds of scripture, there will be lovely tunes of guided reflective prayer.

Each week we will strike some contemporary chords where "playing the silences" is especially needed.

The specific areas: Money makes the World go Round; Relationships; Living and Sharing Food; Health; Thank God for Sport.

The Christian faith has a view on each of these; a good view, a positive view. But, unless we find time to stop and reflect, the notes of life will be sharp and shrill; a series of disconnected sounds that don't thrill us or those around us.

If we are too busy to pray, we are too busy! One day we will have to stop, and it might not be on our own terms. If we have never really asked God into the pleasures and pains of life (and all the stages in between), then we might never know what life can be about. Finding meaning and finding God in these areas can be a blessing to us all.

Lent: a space for you to find God in all you do. Stop, reflect, and journey with us through our season of

Preventing human trafficking, rescuing, and campaigning for reform.

2019: In Cambodia, Uganda and Ethiopia, 88 children reintegrated into families. Many more were served at Lighthouse centres.

440 children at risk met through outreach with many follow ups; 32,000 attended events and wellbeing clubs. In the UK, 16 investigations are going on into human trafficking.

Why Counselling?

Sometimes circumstances and situations can seem to prevent us from living life as we would like to. For others, events that happened in the past, painful experiences in the present or fears about the future seem to prevent us from moving on and living life to the full. Someone coming to TCS may be experiencing depression and anxiety, bereavement and loss, addiction, trauma or be at a change point in their life.

Who are we?

We are a team of professionally trained counsellors and psychotherapists and we offer counselling to young people, adults and couples. Our counselling isn't free of charge but we do have a Bursary Fund for anyone who would struggle to pay the full amount. We can usually arrange counselling in weeks rather than months if we are the right counselling service for you.

Where are we?

We are tucked away in Gilbert House on River Walk, upstairs to the café "65mm Coffee", just opposite the castle. Our riverside location means we are central in the town and in easy walking distance from the station, buses and town parking.

What to expect?

Contact can be made by email or telephone. We will chat with you about your reasons for wanting counselling prior

to making an initial meeting. If we are the right service for your needs, counselling is then arranged with someone from our team of 11 counsellors and is usually weekly for one hour per session.

We believe that successful outcomes are dependent on a safe and trusting relationship and are committed to providing a non-judgemental service at a pace that suits you at your point of need.

What else do we do?

We have a full programme of training from beginners to professionally qualify through our accredited training courses. Our beginner courses are great for anyone who wants to improve self-awareness or listening skills and a great place to start for those who are considering counselling as a career development. We also visit organisations to equip teams to become mental health advocates in their schools, churches and work places, enhancing well-being in these communities. We also have short courses for counsellors and pastoral workers.

Woodland Walk: a local treasure! Richard Dedman reports from the group of volunteers that cares for it.

Woodland Walk was constructed in 1933 by Tonbridge Urban District Council (as it was then known), by men who were finding it hard to get employment between the wars.

The walk runs from the Shipbourne Road to Higham Lane and has a large variety of wildlife, including kingfishers, little egrets, nuthatches, treecreepers, and lots of common garden birds. I have been informed that a gentleman couldn't sleep one night and decided to go for a walk and encountered a small deer, but I cannot confirm that there are some in the woods. It could be, as they frequent the green up towards Shipbourne Common.

The pleasant walk is enjoyed by many members of the public. We have recently unveiled a bench in memory of one of our previous chairs, Maureen Roycroft, who was a great friend of the walk. It can be found just down from the Knight Road entrance.

Occasionally we have litter picks where we get a good response from people who enjoy the tranquillity of the walk, and as such wish to keep it clean and tidy.
