My Faith and My Role in the Community



Vivian Branson

Vivian, a member of St Saviour's congregation, will be known to many for her work as councillor for TMBC, and as an active member of the Kent branch of the Jane Austen Society. We found she has worked in medicine and all around the world ...

Have you always lived in Tonbridge?

No. I was brought up and went to school in Sevenoaks. However, I knew Tonbridge very well.

Tell us about your working life up to now...

I was a medical laboratory scientist specialising in Haematology and Microbiology. After 18 years in the NHS I took a few years off in Rome as an au pair and in Northern Canada testing for metal fatigue in the drilling pipes on the oil rigs. I lived and worked in Belgium, went to agricultural college in Northumberland and finally worked in a Dutch Merchant Bank in London before retiring and moving to Tonbridge.

What led you to stand to be a Borough councillor 14 years ago?

I had just moved to Tonbridge and was feeling very lost. A lifelong friend came to cheer me up (so I thought) and asked me if I had thought of becoming a Borough Councillor. The rest was history...

What are its satisfactions and frustrations?

I love being a Borough Councillor. When a resident contacts me, I never know what their request might be. It's a wonderful feeling to really help people. I love the committee work: I am Chair of Audit and Chair of Area One Planning committees. I suppose frustrations are some people's unrealistic expectations.

What do you think Tonbridge needs to help it recover from the huge setback of coronavirus?

I think everyone and every business needs support and someone listening to them. We need to accept whatever change comes out from this appalling situation and find the positives so that we can move forwards.

You're a member of St Saviour's - do you want to tell us what led you there?

My good friends Claire and Janice Browne introduced me to St Saviour's.

Did you find it easy to fit in? Yes, very easy. The parish links with Jane Austen's family brings us a lot of visitors - especially for the December talks. Are you a lifelong fan, or is it an aspect of Tonbridge you help to promote (or both!)?

No, I haven't been a lifelong fan. I had the most wonderful godmother who invited me to the Jane Austen Society AGM at Chawton in 1969. I really had no idea who Jane Austen was, but it was wonderful.

I joined as a life member very soon afterwards and bought my very first novel at Chawton's bookstall. I jogged along with Jane Austen quite serenely and then moved to Tonbridge. I had absolutely NO idea of the Austens' connections to Tonbridge and I have become more and more enthusiastic ever since.

What is next on the Austen (Kent) wish list?

I would love more people to come to Tonbridge and hear this part of her story. My biggest wish would be to find documentary evidence that Jane visited Tonbridge.

How do you like to spend a day of leisure, all restrictions off? I absolutely love being at home and having visitors who I can take around Tonbridge.

Favourite film, book, meal?

There are so many. I loved Lord of the Rings, the latest movie of Churchill with Gary Oldman, the latest movie of Emma. Of course, my very favourite books are all Jane Austen's works, but I am fairly catholic in my taste: I have just finished Dierdre Wolownick's 'The Sharp End of Life' and started Max Hastings' book about the Vietnam War.

I am strictly vegetarian and mostly vegan and really love any food and don't waste any. We are so privileged to live in a country and at a time when many of us have an abundance of food and choice. We must never forget the deprivations in our country and others around the world.

Here for Youth



The Youth, Children & Families Ministry at Tonbridge Parish Church was 'Here for Youth' in many ways during lockdown, broadcasting **Sunday Club** live at 3pm on YouTube.



Each Sunday Club member received a personalized letter and mini Bible Timeline. Online Sunday Club included a variety of Bible Stories, songs, fun activities or crafts, prayer and the occasional workout!



Activity sheets helped young people keep discovering more about faith and themselves, either individually or within their family units – these are published on the Parish website after each session.



Interaction was encouraged by asking young people, under parental supervision, to share photos of their crafts and creations on social media including the ministry's Facebook, Twitter and Instagram pages.

The team, led by Andy Page, continues to pray for all children and young people as they prepare to return to school in September and updates will be posted on the Facebook page.



Teddies, a toddler group at the Parish Church that usually meets on Tuesday mornings, is blessed with a fantastic group of volunteers who run interactive singing sessions, a creative craft table

and imaginative story time. Virtual Teddies continued to give families with pre-school children an opportunity to enjoy a little taste of Teddies at home during lockdown.

Caroline Zuber, a regular attendee and volunteer, used the Teddies Facebook page and transformed real-life Teddies into an engaging virtual platform with new stories, craft, singing and recipe ideas for families every Tuesday. "We've really enjoyed Virtual Teddies but cannot wait until we are able to be all together again!" says Caroline.

Tiny Acorns is a friendly, supportive and relaxed group for mums with babies under one, suspending its regular Wednesday morning sessions during lockdown (usually starting at 10:30am at St Peter & St Paul all year round) but group leaders have managed to reach out and support families with young babies in other ways.

Global Perspectives



Parish member John Schluter founded Café Africa, a non-governmental organisation, in 2006 to follow a "call by God to do something to improve the livelihoods of smallholder farmers and to restore something of the lost value of Africa's coffee exports".



Training agronomists in Tanzania

Café Africa traditionally starts its meetings with a praver. "We are not a missionary society", says John, "but our core values are based on Judeo-Christian principles". It is with regard to this that John tells a compelling story. Taken aback by the suggestion that a 30-strong meeting with officials in Cameroon might begin with prayer, the Minister of Commerce responded in finger-jabbing irritation that if praying had to happen then it had better be quick. As John was about to start, the person next to him, in a room of different faiths although mainly Protestant and Catholic, rose to his feet while smiling at John and said that "you can't possibly pray sitting down". Later, in Ethiopia, there was another gentle reprimand when John was told that it was customary in that country to pray not just at the start of a meeting but also at the end. Perhaps this is something of what John means when he talks of "God changing the atmosphere in the room... and the outcomes" when prayer was taking place.

limited to operating in only Uganda, Tanzania and the Democratic Republic of Congo, due to a lack of funding. Despite this, John feels that they have made at least a contribution to the cause of raising Africa's position in coffee growing, to awakening governments to the potential of the sector, and to encouraging the industry to have a vision of a better future. John is "unsure quite how it has happened, but we have always had enough to keep going".

Last but not least, bringing about change in the practices of subsistence smallholder farmers is a long game that will "take a generation". Farmers are getting older (the average age in Cameroon is 65) and there is a younger generation, unconvinced that agriculture is worth the effort, making for the bright lights of the city. Large rural farms mean relentless land subdivision, making plot sizes uneconomically small. Imaginative schemes for consolidating land holding are needed but farmers' experiences with co-operatives have resulted in reluctance to pool resources. As John says, "Trust outside the family circle is a challenge".

Reverend Colin Hutchings, 1936 - 2020

In memory of Rev'd Colin Hutchings, who parishioners will remember as a visiting minister when Rev'd Stephen Seamer was our vicar:

Colin knew Tonbridge well - his father Norman was assistant curate 1943-46. Stephen Seamer remembers Colin as "a remarkably humble, almost saintly man, whose pastoral touch helped many people over the years of his ministry [1968-2000/2014]. He was so unassuming but godly and caring, with a willingness to help anyone".

Colin went to Yardley Court Prep School, Tonbridge and Highgate School. After RAF National Service, mainly at a Bomber Command Radar Site in Germany (1955-57), he spent nine years in the carpet trade.

Colin's ministry started in SW England, holding honorary chaplaincy roles at Kilton Hospital Worksop, ATC Cadets

Ferndown, RAF Chilmark, Royal Green Jackets Army Cadets Aylesbury.

Colin and his wife Maureen were a good team. Maureen brought up John, Michael and Rachel and helped the Mother's Union, Stoke Mandeville Hospital's Chaplaincy Team and the WRVS. Colin liked Motor Sport and his Bentley Drivers' Club membership inspired a retirement near Silverstone!

Colin said that his "commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ is total; and I am happy to respond to the call to continue to share the Gospel with any soul or souls whenever and wherever the opportunity is presented". Colin's ministry at Colintree was greatly appreciated. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life... I will never turn away anyone who comes to me." That promise firmly includes Colin.
